FACULTY AWARD DESCRIPTIONS

Emerging Scholar Award

This award recognizes the emerging scholarly achievements of full-time faculty who have a developing record of research, scholarship, or creative activity. Evidence includes publications, grant proposals, copyrighted documents, the development of innovative technology or practice, performances, exhibits, and/or other scholarly activities in any academic field of study.

Faculty Leadership Award

The Faculty Leadership Award is an award of great distinction that recognizes an individual who has made significant contributions to the institution (e.g., task force service, elected governance committees, new initiatives, service to the faculty, service to students) and who exemplifies a commitment to the Molloy University Mission in a spirit of collaboration. This individual is likely to have had an impact on Molloy University, as well as the broader community.

Innovative Online Course Design Award

The Innovative Online Course Design Award recognizes the exceptional online course design of full-time and part-time faculty, as evidenced by a commitment to quality course design that exemplifies effective teaching strategies, continued excellence in online teaching, positive impact on student learning, and innovative approaches to teaching.

Academic Assessment Program Rockstar Award

The Academic Assessment Program Rockstar Award is given to a program in recognition of outstanding program or course-level assessment achievements that contribute to significant continual improvement and substantial faculty engagement in the academic assessment process.

The Lighthearted Lion Award

The Lighthearted Lion Award is presented in recognition of an individual's insight, wisdom and skill in handling diverse teaching and student responsibilities with grace and fortitude. This individual is someone who serves Molloy University students tirelessly, with a collaborative nature and a vision of the future.

Maroon Monocle Award

The Maroon Monocle Award is presented in recognition of an individual's ability to align their philosophy of teaching with research practices in a creative, yet meaningful manner. The ability to creatively align teaching and research practice suggests superior teaching skill that is informed by a faculty member's research.

INNOVATIVE ONLINE COURSE DESIGN AWARD



Rebeca Herrero Sáenz, Ph.D.

Dr. Rebeca Herrero Sáenz, Assistant Professor of Sociology in the School of Arts and Sciences, is the recipient of the Innovative Online Course Design Award for her *Introduction to Sociology* online asynchronous course. This award recognizes a faculty member for the exceptional design of an online course exemplified by using effective teaching strategies that positively impact student learning, incorporation of innovative approaches to teaching, and demonstration of continued professional development in online teaching. This general education course is

engaging and well-designed. Course modules make use of PowerPoint slides with VoiceThread audio that encourage students to participate in pre and post-lecture conversations. At first, students provide reflections on their own experiences or answers to questions related to the lecture topic and then apply concepts and theories presented during the lecture. These conversations on VoiceThread foster and create a learning environment in which students listen to the ideas and voices of their peers. Discussion board topics are based on lecture content, thought-provoking readings, and challenging questions. Through her participation in the student discussions, Dr. Herrero Sáenz models scholarly inquiry and debate. Her course demonstrates the use of best practices proven to be effective ways to involve students in the learning process. Evidence to her expertise in the field of online learning is that Dr. Herrero Sáenz was invited by the VoiceThread company to present the use of pre and post-lectures as part of their 2024 workshop series. THE LIGHTHEARTED LION AWARD



Kerry Mastrangelo, B.S.'95, M.S. FNP,'06, D.N.P.

EMERGING SCHOLAR AWARD



Raymond Blanchard, Ph.D., LMHC, NCC, CCMHC

Since his initial appointment to the Molloy faculty in 2023, Dr. Raymond Blanchard, Assistant Professor of Clinical Mental Health Counseling, has established a robust program of collaborative scholarly research in school-based mental health at Molloy University that serves as a model for his colleagues and students. He was awarded a grant in 2024 from the Association of Counselor Education and Supervision for his study on *Clinical Supervisors' Experiences in School-Based Mental Health Settings Serving Marginalized Communities*. External support of his work underscores the significance and

broader impact of his research in school-based mental health. Dr. Blanchard will share his work at national conferences this academic year. His publication record includes a chapter in a recently edited textbook, an upcoming manuscript for the *Journal of School Mental Health*, and approval of a two-part textbook accepted by Cognella Publishing, to be released in 2026. Dr. Blanchard serves on academic journal editorial boards, and in leadership roles of professional associations. In addition to developing and expanding his own research endeavors, Dr. Blanchard is keen on mentoring the next generation of scholars and supporting their research efforts at local and national conferences. Dr. Blanchard exemplifies the qualities of an emerging scholar. His dedication to research and his collaborative spirit have significantly impacted academic excellence at Molloy University and in the field of Clinical Mental Health Counseling. Andrea Honigsfeld, Ed.D.

Dr. Andrea Honigsfeld is a Professor of Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) in the School of Education and Human Services. She has been a speaker and field researcher in local school districts on Long Island, New York City, and across the country. She is recognized internationally for her work on multilingual learners and language and literacy development. Through her invited keynote presentations, Dr. Honigsfeld shares her scholarly work, personal experience related to teaching best practices, and her breadth of knowledge on educational

research related to immigrant education and multilingual learners. Dr. Honigsfeld has the unique gift of challenging current and future teachers intellectually and supporting them in an ongoing positive way while connecting her teaching to real-life experiences and scholarship. She fosters active learning, discussion, and reflection among her students. Similarly, she provides opportunities for students to practice and apply new knowledge while encouraging a philosophy of lifelong learning. As a researcher and scholar, Dr. Honigsfeld has an extraordinary publication record that includes more than 32 books and 75 published articles. Her colleagues give evidence of her unsurpassed professionalism, outstanding ability to share knowledge, and willingness to provide opportunities for her students and junior professors to publish with her, mentoring the next generation of scholars. Dr. Honigsfeld has dedicated her life to sharing her vast knowledge as a teacher, mentor, volunteer, and role model while expertly aligning her teaching and research practices in a creative and meaningful manner. FACULTY LEADERSHIP AWARD



Vicky Giouroukakis, Ph.D.

Dr. Vicky Giouroukakis serves as the Program Director of Graduate and Postgraduate
Programs for the School of Education and Human Services and is the recipient of the 2025
Faculty Leadership Award. A member of the faculty of Molloy University for twenty years, Dr.
Giouroukakis is a full professor and an expert in her field of English Education. Her commitment to building a sense of community and belonging among graduate students is evidenced by her collaboration with the Office of Research, Scholarship, and Graduate Studies to launch the

first Molloy University School of Education and Human Services Graduate Student Leadership Association and the development of a Graduate Education Newsletter that is shared with students, alumni, and the wider community. Her scholarship portfolio is impressive; it includes five books and an extensive list of peer-reviewed publications and presentations. She has utilized her expertise to develop graduate programs and curricula, mentor faculty, and identify innovative ways to impact our students and the communities in which they live and work. Dr. Giouroukakis leads the annual Literacy Conference for educators at Molloy, hosts an annual Career Fair for students on campus, moderates the ELA Advisory Board, and serves on multiple University committees. Dr. Giouroukakis is an exceptional leader who shares her knowledge and practical experience at local, state, and national levels. AWARD DESCRIPTIONS

The Above and Beyond Award

This award is given to a staff member or administrator who uses their skills and attributes for the betterment of others on campus. This individual "steps up," volunteers, and consistently asks, "how can I help," even when it exceeds their job description. This person shares their time and talent in ways that help all those in our community, above and beyond their role.

The Bartolomé de las Casas Award

This award is given to an administrator, staff or faculty member who has made significant strides in our work to become a more inclusive community. Through their efforts they have advocated for and celebrated the diversity within our community, while supporting every opportunity to grow in a reflective way. This award is named after Bartolomé de las Casas O.P., who gave up his extensive land holdings and slaves and traveled to his homeland in Spain in 1515 to petition to stop the abuses that European colonists were inflicting upon the natives of the New World. He is said to be the first person to call out these injustices and advocate for human rights.

The S. Diane Capuano Service Award

This award is given to an administrator, staff or faculty member who is committed to creating an atmosphere conducive to taking actions that will improve the lives of others either locally and/or globally in their interactions with colleagues and students. This award is named after S. Diane Capuano, who was at one time the Campus Minister at Molloy and currently serves as a member of the Leadership Council for the Sisters of St. Dominic, Amityville.

The S. Leo Francis Monaghan Spirit Award

This award is given to an administrator, staff or faculty member who demonstrates a commitment to choosing good in all their daily interactions, taking actions that improve the lives of others, and developing relationships that foster teamwork. This award is named after S. Leo Francis Monaghan who, as a long-time biology faculty member, actively participated in faculty, student, and alumni events always cheering them on.

The Professional Excellence Award

This award is given to a staff member or administrator who consistently exhibits a professional demeanor and excellence in their role. They are often sought after for advice and guidance and are frequently recognized by their colleagues as a leader among peers, often serving on university-wide committees that advance our charism of service.

The Rookie of the Year Award

This award is given to a staff member or administrator who has made a significant impact on the lives of others at Molloy in a short time.

The S. Mary Nivard Stabile Award

This award is given to an administrator, staff or faculty member who shows a commitment to transforming our community through nurturing habits for professional and personal growth, guiding our students to know their full potential and responding to the needs of others. This award is named after S. Mary Nivard Stabile, who is one of the pioneers of Molloy who assisted in establishing the necessary business offices during its foundational years. She was an economics professor who also served in and developed the positions of Registrar, Director of Admissions and Dean of Students.

The Molloy Team Award

This award is given to a Team, Committee, or Department who, through an innovative approach, have demonstrated risk taking, problem solving and creativity to make improvements on behalf of the University. They serve as an example of teamwork and collaboration amongst fellow colleagues, students, and others in our community. This would apply to any cross-functioning team, committee, or department.

The Mother Anselma Ruth Medal of Presidential Excellence

This award is given to an administrator, staff, and faculty member. It is the highest internal award given to an employee who exemplifies the mission of the University. This individual embodies the University's core values and guiding virtues in such a way as to demonstrate that they live the four pillars; act justly and with kindness in all their endeavors; are respectful of every person; embody ethical leadership; and are committed to transforming the community. This award is named after Mother Anselma Ruth, O.P., the first president of Molloy Catholic College for Women when it was opened in 1955.

THE S. MARY NIVARD STABILE AWARD

Before coming to Molloy more than thirty years ago as a faculty member, Dr. Aprigliano had an extensive and successful career as a Clinical Nurse Specialist at North Shore University Hospital in the Division of Gynecologic
