Rolling deadline. Please submit your application at least 3 weeks prior to the course start date. You will receive a response within 7 business days after the application is received. Scholarships may pay for the entire courseload in 2023, up to \$10,000.

Courses are offered throughout the year on day, evening, and weekend schedules. Some courses are held remotely (online through Zoom) while others are in person. Classes may be held on Molloy's main campus in Rockville Centre; satellite center at 30 Hempstead, Rockville Centre; or Suffolk Center campus in Amityville.
