

Molloy University, in collaboration with community partners, is pleased to be offering its 16th annual Edith Richner Palliative Care Conference on Long Island.

The conference will be held on Friday, June 5, 2026, from 8:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. in the Madison Theater at Molloy's Rockville Centre campus and also online via Zoom. The agenda for the day will include a Keynote Session, a series of topics offered during two concurrent sessions and a Closing Session. The keynote speaker will be **Dr. Cristian Zanartu**, Physician, MJHS and Zanartu Medical PLLC.

The 2026 conference will offer two options to attend: in-person and virtual through Zoom.

The main objective of this year's conference is for the participants to enhance their ability to provide professional, competent, empathetic care to patients and their families.

This year's conference will focus on the new developments in this growing and dynamic field. Experts from medicine, nursing, pastoral care, child life and social work will present the latest advancements in the fields of symptom management, ethics and communication, staff self-care and bereavement. 
